November focused on Hunter graduate student work from NYSAE member Jonny Farrow's Sound Environments class and December's entitled "Heater or Water Hammers" explored domestic heater recordings as well as wax cylinder manipulations and works from Surakarta, Indonesia. January found Edmund Mooney curating "Sonic Serendipity", an exploration of field recordings with unexpected attributes, and a recording of a soundwalk in Redhook Brooklyn with after walk discussion. Upcoming shows will be curated by Andrea

Callard and Jonny Farrow.

NYSAE members Jonny Farrow and Edmund Mooney will be leading a series of soundwalks at Muhlenberg College on Tuesday March 23rd, 2010. They are part of a program on The Ethics of Space, sponsored by the Center for Ethics. Below is the description from the college's bulletin. "The purpose of these soundwalks will be to gain an understanding of the psychogeographical and architectural interferences we experience as sound when exploring the topography of the Muhlenberg campus.

NYSAE member Arline Bronzaft has co-authored, with Louis Hagler, a chapter in the text *Emerging Environmental Technologies, Volume II* from Springer Publications. entitled: *Noise: The Invisible Pollutant that Cannot Be Denied*. New NYSAE member Robin Locke Monda has successfully defended her Integrated Media Arts MFA project at Hunter College. The project, called "Sounds Like Staten Island," is an on- and off-line community listening initiative that targets the borough of Staten Island. Locke Monda sees the site as a "community composition and information trading post" for educators, parents, artists, musicians, students, community activists and everyday citizens.

Learning to Capture the Quiet. Each year since 2003, a group from 10 to 20 people has gathered for the purposes of sharing and recording natural sounds. The group has included sound artists, composers, birders, biologists, naturalists, media educators, filmmakers, news reporters and trackers. All have shared an interest in learning what nature has to give to their ears and the best methods for detecting and capturing these experiences. The primary learning tools have been shared excursions, in-field demonstrations, collective camping and conversation. We have enjoyed the presence of recordists with many years of experience and great intimacy with the natural surroundings as well novices eager to soak-up everything about the techniques and the environment as they can. Everyone has been welcomed and all have left fulfilled.

Crex Meadows Outing. For Spring 2010, a group will be gathering at the largest Wildlife Area in the state of Wisconsin, Crex Meadows. Crex Meadows is 30,000 acres of wetland, pine barrens and woodland. <http://www.crexmeadows.org> The area is additionally surrounded by many square miles of State and County Forest as well as nearby Fish Lake Wildlife Area and the St Croix River, a Federally protected Wild River. A seven-hour drive from Chicago and a two-hour drive from Minneapolis, the site will be at the height of activity during Spring songbird migration. We are currently determining the exact date from the first 3 weekends in May. We'll have cabins with bunk beds and a mess hall for preparing and sharing meals. "Acoustic Mirror of the World" at Chicago Underground Library. The World Listening Project's "Acoustic Mirror of the World" is a sculpture/installation conceived and constructed by Eric Leonardson and Gregory O'Drobinak to provide a predominantly tactile, bodily sensation of soundscapes from around the world. These soundscapes are in recorded form and are submitted by anyone who responds to the WLP's open invitation. It was last shown at the Little Black Pearl art and design center last December. The AMW returns with new sounds for public display at the Chicago Underground Library's new location. An opening celebration for the CUL, entitled the "Loud Library" happens on February 25. The event will feature public participation and performances by Chicago Phonography. The CUL and MSAE are planning public soundwalks, audio archiving, and other partnered activities in the future.

FKL REPORT: The Sicilian Soundscape Research Group (SSRG) Submitted by Lorenz Schwarz

The "Science and Soundscape" conference was held on December 5th, 2009 in Catania, Sicily, Italy. The purpose of the conference, organized by the [SSRG](#) section of the [Forum Klanglandschaft](#), was to compare different methods of research, in which the sound is a tool for investigation of reality, or the object of the survey itself, with the aim of suggesting new perspectives for the research. Speakers included FKL members Zorzanello Stefano, Fabio Securella, and Albert Mayr, who presented some aspects of their work. More about the conference can be found [online](#) (in Italian).

A Typology of Sound Maps. (Weird Vibrations) Sound maps are graphic catalogs of music, noise, local ambient color, or anything else audible. Most often based on city boundaries, they typically plot sound on a Google Map (or something similar) – as art projects, policy evidence, historical archives, or consumer tools. [Read More](#). Immerse yourself in the Ambisonic sound of the Arctic. (WIRED) Field recording artist Ross Adams travelled with a group of Sami reindeer herders during their 2009 migration, documenting the entire 350km journey on Ambisonic surround-sound equipment. Ambisonics are rarely-used surround-sound techniques that aims to recreate an accurate, omnidirectional soundfield in two or three dimensions -- one where all directions are given equal weight. 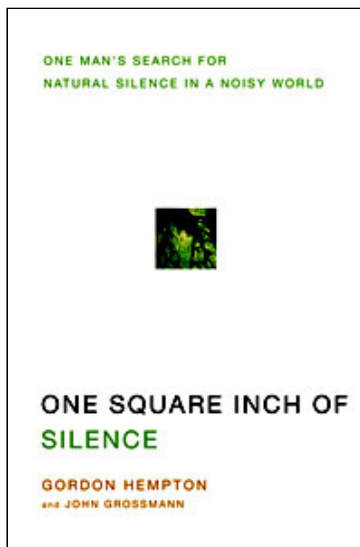

Book: One Square Inch of Silence: One Man's Search for Natural Silence in a Noisy World. (FREE PRESS Simon & Schuster, Inc.) By Gordon Hempton and John Grossmann. Having completed a coast-to-coast mission to preserve and protect natural soundscapes, Gordon Hempton proclaims that, "The extinction rate for quiet places vastly exceeds the rate of species extinction." Part road trip, part popular science, and part polemic, One Square Inch of Silence is a celebration of nature and an ear-opening journey into Earth's vanishing sanctuaries. Like a sound safari, One Square Inch of Silence recounts Hempton's trek across the country to capture the sounds of American landscapes and the reflections of American people on the importance of quiet in their lives.

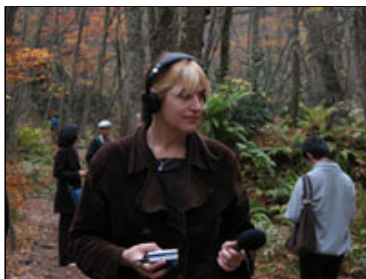

Web: Singing Insects of North America. (Scout Report) How does one distinguish a katydid from a cricket? This website provides an answer to that question, along with samples of calls from other insects, including cicadas. The site was created by Thomas J. Walker and Thomas E. Moore, and it was designed to be of assistance to both professional and amateur biologists interested in studying singing insects. First-time visitors should scroll down to the "How to Use" section in order to get quick and concise answers from the site, such as "How to identify an unknown cricket, katydid, or cicada". On the top of the homepage, visitors can also click on the "Crickets", "Katydids", or "Cicadas" areas. Each of these areas includes a table of species, complete with links to songs, photos, distribution maps, and drawings. [Visit site](#).

Micro-Narratives in Sound Design: Context, Character, and Caricature in Waveform Manipulation. By Maribeth Back and D.Des. (ICAD) This paper reviews sound design techniques used in professional audio for music and theater and proposes a conceptual approach to the construction of audio based in narrative structure. The sound designer does not attempt to replicate "real" sounds; the task is rather to create the impression of a real sound in a listener's mind. In this attempt to create a sound in the listener's mind, the sound designer is aided by user expectations based upon cultural experience as well as physical experience. Practical sound manipulation techniques are discussed in view of their usefulness in matching a listener's mental model of a sound. Narrative aspects of audio design in computational environments are also delineated. Some keywords involved in this paper are sound design, auditory display, multimodal interaction, interface design, narrative, sonic narrative, micro-narrative, and audio. [Read More](#).
